

CORNUS STOLONIFERA

“FLAVIRAMEA”



Fam. Cornaceae

DESCRIPTION

Coarse, shrubby plant, with an average height between 1.7 and 2.5 metres and a width between 1.5 to 2.2 metres.

LEAVES

Deciduous leaves with ovate or oblong dark-green leaves that turn reddish-green in autumn.

HABITAT

Native to northern and western North America.

FRUITS

White berries that attract little birds in autumn and winter.

DISTRIBUTION

In Italy it is used as an ornamental garden plant.

STEM

Its golden-yellow wood is very decorative in winter after the leaves have fallen.

FLOWERS

They are small and yellowish-white, bundled in panicles. The plant blooms between May and June.

INTERESTING FACTS

Also known as Golden-twig dogwood, it is gorgeous when bare in winter with its lime-gold branches. The gardens of Venaria house the cultivar *Cornus stolonifera* “Flaviramea” with deciduous leaves.

ROOTS

Fasciculated and resistant root system that guarantees excellent soil retention.
